First-year student dies over spring break

Those who had the chance to know first-year student Alena Jarvis remember her as an energetic, upbeat person who always put others before herself and made everyone around her laugh.

Jarvis, a 19-year-old a political science major from Battle Ground, Washington died Wednesday. Her death was ruled a suicide.

Her best friend of seven years, Talia Orelli, 19, said Jarvis had a unique sense of humor.

"I would cry from laughing so hard," said Orelli.

She said Jarvis would give people nicknames simply to make them smile.

"She called me Talia Bedalia and I called her Harvey, because one time someone mistook her last name for Harvey instead of Jarvis," Orelli remembered, laughing. "It made her so mad."

Jarvis graduated from Battle Ground High School. Her senior year, she received the General George C. Marshall Youth Leadership Award, which is presented to a high school senior who "demonstrates leadership, takes a stand for the rights of others, serves as a role model, shows initiative and motivates others to become involved," according to The George C. Marshall Foundation.

Joshua Jimenez, Jarvis' JROTC coach at her high school in Battle Ground, remembered her as incredibly motivated and an inspiration to her peers.

"The impact she had on students, someone could be around her and be very discouraged, but she always knew what to say to get them to re-evaluate where they were at and

give them inspiration," Jimenez said.

Jarvis, though small in stature, made her presence known with her robust voice. Jimenez said at one physical training session she yelled so hard and loud that her voice gave out.

"Her voice got extremely raspy, and it got to a point where she sounded more manlier than most of the dudes there," Jimenez said. "But she worked hard, if not harder than them."

Jarvis had plans to go into the military and later begin a career at the State Department. According to The Reflector, she had an interest in signals intelligence, the analysis of electronic data and information gathered and intercepted during surveillance to provide critical security information to policy makers and the armed forces.

Orelli said above all, Jarvis' compassion and care for others will live on.

"She always cared about me more than herself," Orelli said. "She supported me through hard times."

The campus learned of her death Monday from a student-wide email sent from Vice-Chancellor of Student Affairs Kathy Cavins-Tull.

"We are saddened by the loss of a valued member of our community and our thoughts and prayers are with Alena's family at this time," Cavins-Tull wrote.

Her family has not released any information regarding funeral or memorial services.

"This is, of course, a very difficult time for them," wrote Juli Hamilton, a family spokesperson.

"Alena was their entire world, and she meant a great deal to the AFJROTC cadets and families here at home."

Cavins-Tull urged

Pi Kappa Phi reaches \$1 million goal

Pi Kappa Phi chapters across the country raise money for their philanthropy – The Ability Experience.

But TCU's Eta Chi chapter has raised more than \$1 million for the charity since its founding in 1998.

TCU's Pi Kappa Phi 2016 Philanthropy Chairman, Calvin Layman, learned of the accomplishment during Supreme Chapter, where chapters of Pi Kapp from across the country meet together and receive awards.

But the men in the chapter are not the only ones inspired by this achievement.

"To see that we were the ones that did that was pretty cool," said Layman.

The chapter hosts a variety of fundraising events, particularly during The Ability Experience Week, ending with their "Pi Kapp Push" event.

"It's really just our thing and our way to give back," said Pi Kapp President Morris Herman.

He said it's not just thanks to the donors that the chapter reached the \$1 million benchmark.

"It's really a testament to the guys that started our fraternity," he said. "Everybody who's come before us really led us to the million dollars and hopefully the next million."

Layman said the accomplishment gave more than just pride to the chapter.

"Everyone was just really excited, I think, and almost motivating," Layman said. "We've hit

There was even a video produced by one of the founders of the Ability Experience congratulating the Eta Chi chapter on their success.

"It's motivating for a lot of the other chapters," said Layman. "As long

as we've been around, we've pretty much been top fundraising. We've been hitting our goals every year and it kind of pisses off a lot of the other chapters because we win every year, which I think is really awesome."

Pi Kappa Phi is unique from other fraternities

because it is the only fraternity that has their own philanthropy. The Ability Experience is specifically owned and operated by Pi Kappa Phi.

"That's the whole reason I came to TCU, is for their Pi Kapp chapter basically," said first-year student Layton Rodgers.

"Their fundraising - their push week raises a ton of money for the TCU chapter and it's like widely known throughout Pi Kappa Phi as a whole that the Eta Chi chapter is one of the top chapters."

Rogers' father founded the Journey for Hope, a 72-day cross-country biking event incorporated into The Ability Experience.

TCU's Pi Kapp chapter has six members, including Rogers, going on different routes this summer. There are three different routes to Washington, D.C. - the Transamerica route, the north route and south route.

Bikers start from either Seattle, Los Angeles or San Francisco and arrive at Washington, D.C., on the same day.

Alpha Chi Omega's fashion show raises awareness

Glitz and glam filled the ballroom of the Hilton Hotel in downtown Fort Worth at Alpha Chi Omega's annual philanthropy event on the afternoon of Feb. 19.

The event benefited the Alpha Chi Omega Foundation and The Women's Center of Tarrant County. Over \$110,000 was raised, said Fashion Show Committee Chair Carly Boobar.

Women between the ages of 18-24 are the most common victims of domestic violence, according to the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence.

Models and retailers chair Juliette Hollihan said open discussion

about domestic violence is essential.

"I just want people to be more comfortable talking about their experiences and reaching out for help," Hollihan said.

Domestic violence makes up 15 percent of violent crimes, and suicidal behavior and depression correlate with domestic violence, according to the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence.

A selection of students walked in the show to raise awareness about domestic violence. Sophomore model Bryar Ferguson spoke about the importance of gender equality.

"I think as a man, respect and equal treatment of women is just so important," Ferguson said. "I

think that if you're a person that abuses your girlfriend or spouse, I mean, I'm not sure if you can even call yourself a man."

More than 600 people attended the event, which included a fashion show, silent auction, and raffle. Retailers around Fort Worth donated clothes for students to model.

Some students at the event said they had personal connections to domestic violence.

"I feel domestic violence is such an issue that kind of goes unnoticed sometimes," sophomore model Helen Prebys said. "Personally I am a victim of sexual assault and it's really cool that I can stand up and do something about it but have a good time while doing it."

Track and field produces 14 event wins at outdoor season opener

TCU Track and Field opened their outdoor season at the Lowdon Track and Field Complex on a high note. Six athletes recorded personal bests and the Horned Frogs collected 14 event wins as a team this weekend.

"We had an outstanding first meet," said director of track and field Darryl Anderson. "I think it was the best first meet we've had in a long time."

Friday's Events

To kick off the weekend, the Frogs recorded three first-place finishes out of the four events held.

Senior Paola Miranda grabbed first in the women's hammer throw with a mark of 189 feet, 2 inches (57.65 meters) on

her second attempt.

Sophomore Fellan McGuigan and freshman Ryan Camp posted regional-qualifying marks as they both recorded first-place finishes in the hammer throw and discus. McGuigan recorded a throw of 201 feet, 11 inches (61.54 meters) in the hammer throw. Camp recorded a distance of 176 feet, 6 inches (53.80 meters) in the discus, moving him to No. 5 on TCU's all-time list.

Sophomore Justin Sanchez grabbed second in the hammer throw with a mark of 181 feet, 6 inches (55.32 meters).

Saturday's Events

The women's 4x100-meter relay team of seniors Judy Emeodi and Sabrina Moore, and sophomores Briona Oliver and Kayla Heard placed second with a time of 44.78.

Heard recorded a personal best with a first-place finish in the 400 meters at 53.23, moving her into TCU's top 10 all-time list. Senior Tiffany Terry and sophomore Jaden Davis notched third and fifth finishes with times of 54.67 and 55.81.

Moore moved to No. 4 on TCU's all-time list after placing second in the 100-meter dash with a personal best of 11.40. She also recorded a personal best in the 200 meters at 23.69.

Emeodi also recorded two personal bests with times of 11.55 and 23.75 in the 200 and 100 meters.

Big 12 Conference 5,000 kilometer champion, sophomore Brenley Goertzen placed first in the 1500 meters, winning by more than 11 seconds with a time of 4:27.36, moving her to No. 5 on TCU's all-time

list. Junior Dominique Tilly placed seventh with a time of 4:46.29.

Sophomore Brittney Trought recorded a first-place finish in the 100-meter hurdles with a time of 13.31, the third fastest time in school history. Senior Makaila Flannigan and sophomore Lexi Aitken grabbed fifth and sixth with times of 13.99 and 14.06.

Aitken also produced a personal best in the 400 hurdles, placing first with a 59.60.

The men's team of seniors Raymond Bozmann and Jalen Miller, junior Emeilo Ferguson and sophomore Darrion Flowers notched a first-place finish with a time of 39.89, setting the tone for the meet.

TCU swept the top three spots in the 400-meter dash. Sophomore Derrick Mokaleng finished first

at 46.73, junior Kevin McClanahan finished second at 46.92 and freshman Jostyn Andrews finished third at 47.15.

Freshman Isaiah Rogers moved to TCU's all-time list as he won the shot put with a mark of 57 feet, 5.75 inches (17.57 meters).

Senior Dekan Ekpo placed eighth in the 200-meter dash at 21.59, and senior Shane Murray placed eighth in the 3000 meters at 9:30.42.

Terry, Heard, Aitken and Davis recorded a first-place finish at 3:40.64 in the women's 4x400-meter relay. The men's 4x400-meter relay squad of Flowers, Andrews, McClanahan, and Mokaleng also recorded a first-place finish at 3:09.20.

The Horned Frogs are set to compete at the Texas Relays from March 29-April 1.

Basketball advances to NIT Semifinals at Madison Square Garden

The Horned Frogs will go to the the NIT semifinals at Madison Square Garden in New York for the first time in school history.

On the one year anniversary of TCU men's basketball head coach Jamie Dixon's arrival to Fort Worth, TCU out-muscled the Richmond Spiders in Fort Worth, for a dominant 86-68 victory Tuesday night.

"This program has come so far from when I was here my freshman year with a winless conference season, 0-18, and now I'm headed to New York for the semifinals of the NIT," TCU guard Brandon Parrish said. "It hurt not to go to the NCAA tournament, but when

you play for a team that hasn't seen the postseason in years how can that not motivate you to do your best to bring an enthusiasm to the basketball program that hasn't been seen in so long."

The game started out as a close affair, but that all changed after the 13:02 mark in the first half when TCU led Richmond by a point, 10-9. After that, the Horned Frogs went on an 11-0 run that pushed TCU's lead to 12, 21-9, powered by TCU forward Vladimir Brodziansky, who scored six of the points on the run through a variety of a jump-hook, lay-up, and a pull-up jumper.

TCU guard Kenrich Williams missed a first-half double-double by a point, as he went into the locker room with nine points and ten rebounds.

However, he finished the game with TCU's first ever triple-double, totaling 11 points, 14 rebounds, and 10 assists.

"I didn't even know I was close to a triple-double right until the end when my teammates told me, so I looked for that last pass," Williams said. "My teammates did a great job of making plays tonight."

Brodziansky scored 16 of his team-high 20 points in the first 20 minutes on an efficient five-of-eight shooting, as the Horned Frogs led 41-26 at the half.

Just 2:15 into the second half, the Horned Frogs went on a 13-1 run on the strength of 3 three-pointers by Desmond Bane, JD Miller, and Parrish in a span of about 90 seconds.

The Horned Frogs' four seniors Parrish,

Karviar Shepherd, Chris Washburn Jr., and Mike Williams capped off their final game in Fort Worth in style, addressing the crowd over the public address system before heading to the locker room.

"We thank the TCU community and our students each and every

day for what they've done for us and the energy they've brought to Schollmaier Arena to provide a home court advantage like ours," Parrish said.

TCU Chancellor Victor Boschini played his part in rallying the students for Tuesday's game, paying for a free hot dog, bag

of chips, drink, and ice cream for every student in attendance.

"I just wanted to thank our students for how they've shown up all basketball season," Boschini said. "I think having them all here really made a difference."

Reaching the Semifinals of the NIT is an accomplishment for a basketball program that hasn't reached the postseason since 2005, but Dixon isn't satisfied with where his team is yet.

"We still have more things to prove this season," Dixon said.

TCU's next game will tipoff at Madison Square Garden on March 28 at either six or eight p.m. against either the University of Illinois or the University of Central Florida.

“Beauty and the Beast” Review

Disney’s latest live-action remake, “Beauty and the Beast,” looks great but it’s held down by too many flaws.

The plot is largely similar to the 1991 animated original: Belle (Emma Watson) is captured by the mysterious Beast (Dan Stevens) and must teach him to love in order to break a magical spell. Unfortunately, what worked in the animated version was skimmed or replaced with new things to make it more modern, which doesn’t pay off in any satisfying way.

The execution itself is problematic. The new material comes across as unnecessary and doesn’t really add much to the story. In fact, some of the material addresses plot holes from the original and inadvertently makes them more noticeable.

The new material also causes the film to suffer from pacing issues as well. The pace switches from fast to slow within moments, with slower scenes often focusing on the wrong thing. This makes the first and second acts feel longer than they need to without providing any emotional attachment.

The music echos the plot’s mixture of new and old. While the music is generally well-done, the autotune of Watson and Stevens’ voices largely detracts from their songs. Luke Evans, on the other hand, proves his singing ability as Gaston but is underused. The new songs also seem out of place in the context of the story and drag out moments that could have been expressed in a better way.

The biggest problem is Watson as Belle. Watson is horribly miscast, often coming across as too serious or callous to

those around her. Her general lack of emotion through the film’s events emphasize this even more, making her seem lifeless or uninterested during key moments. Watson also uses her natural British accent throughout the film, creating a weird disconnect between the role and the source material.

Stevens puts forth a passable effort as Beast, but this version of the character is more serene than scary. The castle staff (comprised of Ewan McGregor, Ian McKellen, Emma Thompson, and Stanley Tucci) provide much needed energy for the film.

The real standout of the film, surprisingly, is Evans as Gaston. Evans plays the narcissistic villain perfectly, giving off an air of pompousness and emotional instability. Josh Gad compliments him well as LeFou, feeding Evans’ performance with his admiration.

Outside of Gaston, the film’s character development is subpar. Gaston has the most complex arc thanks to a few moments that make him seem more human and his actions believable. Unfortunately, Beast’s character arc is almost

non-existent and Belle’s growth occurs too late to really count.

The best aspect of the film is its visuals. The sets and costumes are incredible, looking realistic while keeping a distinctly magical flair. The CGI is also well-done and blends nicely with the actors and backdrops. This helps some specific moments from the animated original translate perfectly to the remake and become more impactful.

Unfortunately, the beautiful visuals can’t keep the film from feeling uninspired. Fans of the original are better off watching that instead while newcomers may be put off by the plot holes and slower pace. Audiences looking solely for eye candy will find it nice, but it’s hard to recommend beyond that.

Verdict:
“Beauty and the Beast” is an unnecessary adaptation that captures the spectacle of the original, but not the substance.





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
