# More men attending TCU

For many students at TCU, the three complaints that are constant during their time on campus are about StuWireless, the food in Market Square and the women to men ratio.

But that last one is making a change as the new first-year class has the highest percentage of male students since 1990.

The class of 2021 is 42 percent men and 58 percent women, said assistant director of Institutional Research, Lindsey Millns.

Students have noticed the imbalanced ratio in years past.

"All my classes are mainly females with one token male in each class," said Kirstin Mullins, a senior strategic communication major.

Senior nursing major, Julie Torrey, also said her major is primarily composed of women.

"In nursing, I think it's more of a negative one to five," Torrey said.

Despite students' reactions, the percentage of male students in first-year enrollment has been on the rise since 2013.

Since 2007, an average of 38.5 percent male students enrolled in first-year classes.

Heath Einstein, the dean of admissions, said gender is a factor, but not a top priority.

"Gender is one of the ways we look at the [student body], but we want to make sure we are attracting a student body that is reflective of

society," he said. "We are looking at where students are coming from, what their background is, what life experiences they've been through and many more aspects."

The TCU Admissions Department did a study and commissioned an outside consultant to research the gender ratio and found the following results.

Two of the strongest, best-known programs are education and nursing. Those are career paths typically pursued by women, not men.

The absence of a law school and a medical school drives some men away.

More men participate in the engineering program; however, the size of the program is small. "There are a lot of theories as to why TCU usually enrolls more women than men," Einstein said. "And there is probably an element of truth to all those theories."

Since the first-year male ratio increased to 42 percent, Einstein has seen subtle differences on campus.

"There were fewer women that went through recruitment this year," Einstein said. "That could be a function of the lower percentage."

Andrew Wilson, vice president of fraternity recruitment, said he saw changes in recruitment, too.

This year, 615 men registered for recruitment, Wilson said. The average for the past four years has been 569.

Some students, however, still haven't

noticed the difference in the ratio.


"When [I'm] at the BLUU [I] don't notice the ratio," said Ethan Gallegous, a sophomore business major. "I don't know if that's the campus size or the flow of the buildings."

Junior history and political science major Jayce Ramsey, however, said the male to female ratio appears more balanced since her first-year class when the ratio was 61 percent women and 39 percent men.

"I feel like when I

was a freshman, it was very noticeable that there was more girls than boys, but I do feel like the incoming class seems a lot more equal," Ramsey said.

Einstein said he doesn't know what the ratio will look like for next year's class, but admissions are aware of the male-to-female ratio balance when crafting the upcoming classes. Einstein said he is happy for now with where the male ratio is at and is excited to see it increase in the future.

# TCU reacts to deadly Las Vegas mass shooting

For some students, news of Sunday night's mass shooting in Las Vegas was personal.

TCU has 20 students from Nevada - half are from Las Vegas. Gillian Meservey, a Las Vegas native, said one of the first things she did after learning of the attack was check in with family and friends.

Meservey said she knew a few people who were at the concert where at least 59 people died and another 500 were hurt.

"The majority made it out safely, but one got trampled by people

running away, and another one was shot in the shoulder and her mom was shot in the chest," Meservey said. "They are both getting taken care of right now."

TCU Class of 2016 alumna Elle Gargano was reported injured. A GoFundMe page describes her as "the most selfless and sweetest humans" and says all donations will go "towards her medical expenses and recovery." So far, the page, which has a goal of \$80,000, has raised more than \$82,939 as of Wednesday afternoon.

Meservey said emotions are running high in the city.

"I think everyone right now is scared and honestly angry," Meservey said. "There isn't a whole lot of information, and I think we all really want to know why he did it, but because he killed himself, the motive is gonna be hard to find out."

Despite the violence, Meservey said she sees unity out of all of this from both Las Vegas and TCU.

"I think that Las Vegas is already a very united community, so I think this will only bring us closer together," Meservey said. "I woke up to a bunch of texts from my TCU friends asking about how my

family was, so I felt a lot of support."

Student Government Association President Ben Taylor condemned the actions of the shooter, Stephen

Paddock.

"The violence shown there is absolutely disgusting," Taylor said. "A lesson I would want the campus to take from this is, remember to keep

an eye out for yourself, keep an eye out for your friends. Be aware of what kinds of mental illness could be weighing on your minds."

# Police are enforcing new safety policies for ESPN College GameDay

Fans who come out to the Campus Commons this weekend for ESPN's College GameDay should expect an increase of police presence, as TCU tries to strike a balance between safety and fun.

TCU has been working on new safety plans for a while, such as increased supervision and stricter policies regarding entering Amon G. Carter Stadium and the Commons, Officer Tom McLaughlin said.

However, Officer George Steen said the recent Las Vegas attack has affected the way they

are approaching this weekend's events.

"We will just have to look at things a little more diligently when searching for any indicators in the crowd," he said. "We want to make sure our students and guests know that we're here to make them as safe as possible but also allow them to still be able to enjoy the game."

To monitor who is entering and leaving the event, Steen said several police officers will be at all points of entrance to the Commons. Additionally, both TCU police and Fort Worth police will be stationed throughout the crowd to

look for any suspicious behavior.

"If a person is in fan gear and looks like a student, that is fine," said Steen. "It's the people who don't characteristic look like fans that we will keep a closer eye on."

In addition to increased campus surveillance, the stadium will be locked Friday and people will only be granted access if they have an escort.

"Everybody entering has to be on a list, have an access card or have a person escorting them around the stadium once we go into the lockdown mode," McLaughlin said.


More cameras are also being installed throughout Frog Alley and TCU's campus.

"We're putting cameras in purposely for game day," Steen said. "We aren't trying to make a secret of it."

College GameDay is Saturday from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. in the Commons.

# Women's cross country places third; volleyball, equestrian fall short

TCU traveled to College Station last weekend to compete at the Texas A&M Invitational. The women competed in the 6,000-meter race and the men in the 8,000-meter race.

The women placed third with a team average of 21:41.

Junior Brenley Goertzen made her season debut, placing second overall with a time of 20:36.1. Goertzen's time is one second off her Big 12 Conference Championship time of 20:35.1.

Senior Nicole Hicks crossed the line next for the women, grabbing 15th place behind a time of 21:41.5. Sophomore Lindsay Tomaini finished

18th with a time of 21:45.3.

First-year Evelyn Mandel finished behind a time of 21:59, sophomore Kirsten Johnston behind a time of 22:24.6, junior Elizabeth Baker behind a time of 23:17.6 and senior Dominique Tilly behind a time of 23:25.2.

On the men's side, senior Henry Butz crossed the line first for the third consecutive meet. He finished with a time of 26:56.5. *Written by Maya Bulger.*

**VOLLEYBALL**

The Frogs were unable to fight off a strong Kansas attack on Saturday afternoon as the Jayhawks defeated the Frogs 3-0 (25-22, 25-17, 25-21) in Lawrence, Kansas.

The Frogs matched

Kansas' blows to keep the game tied on 15 occasions in the first set. The Jayhawks began to roll late in the set, but a Kansas run to win the first set 25-22 proved to be the difference maker in the match.

Junior middle blocker Anna Walsh led the Frogs with 12 kills on the match. This was her fifth time leading the team in kills this season and the eighth game she has tallied double-digit kills in a match. She finished the match with a .364 hitting clip, marking her ninth game this season with a hitting clip above .300.

First-year student outside hitter Allye Beth Deaton earned 10 kills on the match and redshirt freshman Abigail Buckingham totaled

nine kills. First-year libero Dani Dennison anchored the defensive backline with 10 digs on the match. Dennison earned double-digit digs in 13 of the team's 14 matches this season. Junior outside hitter Ashleigh Martin recorded nine digs. Junior setter Lamprini Konstantinidou led the team in assists for the ninth time this season with 22. Senior setter Kaylee Smith tacked on 16 assists.

With the loss, the Frogs fall to 8-6 on the season and 0-3 in Big 12 action. *Written by Robbie Vaglio.*

The team won 3-2 in Western with rides from first-year Adrianna Adams and sophomores

Elena Hurd and Carly Lombard. Adams scored a 71.5 on Stewie, beating SMU's Keagan Snively's re-ride score of 65.5.

The Horned Frogs tied the Mustangs in Western with a score of 5-5. In Horsemanship, two of the rides were decided by half a point.


